Title of the practice: Special camp at Chittela village The context that required the initiation of the practice: The motto of institution is "Service to humanity is service to God" having surveyed a remote village by name Chittela which is in a deplorable condition we strongly felt the need to extend our support to uplift the village. After thorough discussion in the staff council meeting we decided to conduct a special camp at Chittela village after getting permission from Krishna university Machilipatnam. Eventually action plan is prepared to conduct the special camp in the month of February to address the issues such as illiteracy, poor health , malnutrition and social evils like open defecation . NSS unit of the institution prepared ground to organize a special camp Objectives of the practice : To spare some time and share knowledge and show care for the dejected people To educate the people over their deplorable condition To improve socio economic conditions of Chittela village through survey, service and support To inculcate the habit of serving the poor and needy among the students To create positive image on public funded institutions like ours among the people The Practice : After thorough survey conducted in Chittela village, NSS unit of our institution planned to organize one week special camp in Chittela from 5.2.2018 to 11.2.2018 and sent a letter to Krishna University NSS unit seeking its consent and financial support. After receiving the letter of consent from the university it released day wise plan of action for a week in the form of a brochure After the inaugural session at primary school, chittela by Nallagatla Swamidasu, Ex MLA NSS volunteers distributed the work to be done every day. On 6.2.2018 around 40 students cleared the thorny bushes and branches that hinder the path. On 7.2.2018 a group of 45 students addressed social evils such as throwing garbage on the streets and open defecation etc at the village cross roads and appealed the villagers to give up the bad practices as they are below dignity and give rise to many health issues. They pleaded them to throw garbage in the bins meant for it and build toilets and use them to keep the village

clean and to maintain public sanitation and dignity. On 8.2.2018 special camp arranged at Mandal parishat Primary school chittela threw light on the imporatance of education. Villagers and 45 NSS volunteers were present in the meeting. On 9.2.2018 50 NSS volunteers conducted a rally and educated the people on bad consequences of open defecation and persuaded the people to give up the bad practice and use toilets for that purpose. Eventually they took up street cleaning drive. On 10.2.2018 health awreness session of doctor gangadhararao, educated the public on health and role of personal hygiene to keep health. On the final day of special camp the NSS unit officer Sri M. Jayaraju conveyed his gratitude to the concerned authorities for their support. Obstacles faced if any and strategies adopted to overcome them : Poor transportation to the village and difficulties in crowd pulling and convincing them to give up age old bad practices With support extended by the authorities, committed team of volunteers and tactful NSS officer Mr.Jayaraju, all these obstacles gradually withered away. Providing food and shelter to the volunteers This is over come by generosity of villagers and village authorities. Resources required: Invitations to special guests, Programme sheet ,Placards to conduct ODF rally etc are got ready by NSS officer M.Jayaraju Impact of the practice : Students learn to spare some time for social cause and share knowledge for the upliftment of uneducated and learn to take care for others. They learnt that example is better than precept and self discipline and commitment is required to achieve Swachha Andhra, Healthy Andhra and Beautiful Andhra. Their active participation in removing thorny bushes from the village path and cleaning the village streets without any inhibition revealed their traits. This camp gave the students an opportunity to show their leadership qualities in serving and helping the hapless and understand the importance of education in socio economic Transformation.
